near the year 1792 Two Men
by the name of Aaron Crowsan
and Percifield came to Wears
Cove to look them out a home
and Enter Land the white folks
upon the Cove was inhabited
by Indians They got after Crowsan
and Percifield ran them out
killed Percifield Crowsan was on
a good horse and out ran them
and got a way rode on to Walden
Creek at the andese place
there was a Fort there He got
Men to come back and Buried
Percifield on the farm where
he Entered and lived on until
he died and was Buried at the
same place where Percifield
was. Part of the farm is in
the Crowsan name yet. in a
short while Crowsan came
back cut timber hued the logs
and Built himself a house
at the age of Eighteen years old.
I dont know where he came
from when he came here but it
seems to me like it was N. C.

or Virginia are not sure.
His wife was a Barris. They
reared a Large Family Seven Sons
Richard was the youngest one the
third on the farm that his
Father Entered. Three Daughters
Betsey Crowsan Married a Barris,
Hulda Crowsan Married a Amirine,
Sallie Crowsan Married a Barris.
She went to Missipy Aaron Crowsan
was a Tall Broad Shouldered
Man and good natured and loved
Children and would always take
Time to stop and talk to them a
Long the road and was a grate
Lump of Horses. Richard Crowsan
Married Nancy Mattox for Father
was William Mattox for Mother was
a Williams she was raised on
the farm that is known as the
Red Jim Lanson Farm they
raised six children - three Sons
three daughters Aaron, Mary Joseph
West Sarah and Carol.
Mary Married Jeff Wear,
Sarah Married J. Susan Bratte
Nickals. Joseph Married Randall

West Married Martha Louisa
 King. Sarah Married Bruce
 McManahan. Carrie Married
 John Agett. Their Mother was a
 Good Wife, good Mother and a
 good Christian Lady and
 was good to the Poor. They went
 to Truckee Cove once a year to
 the Camp-ground near Lakeside
 and spent weeks at Camp meetings
 had wonderful meetings.
 Near the year 1840 Richard
 Crossan I furnished the material
 to Build a Church House on the Valley
 and a Man by the name of Reinhold
 Hatcher Built it mostly by himself
 the first Church house that was
 built in the Valley, and Sarah
 Crossan Built the first dwelling
 house in the Valley. The Crossans
 were good hearted people but
 like most of families made
 mistakes but quick to repent.
 They were all Methodist people,
 and Believed in Heart & Not
 Religion. In the year 1827
 I think it was.

The people in the Valley Built an
 other Methodist Church House.
 Richard gave over one hundred dol
 in it. Jo and West Crossan
 gave the Seiling to Seil of
 Mith. Aaron gave a lot too dont
 know just what anything I do
 know that he was a good Christian
 man and was always ready to help
 and do good anywhere. He married
 Susan Trotter Michal and is still
 a fine and is ninty years old.
 They raised two sons.

West and Joseph. West married
 Polly Headrick they have three children
 Pearl, Carrie and Walter. Joe is gone
 left an son Loy Crossan.

Richard West Crossan married Martha
 King they raised two sons Will and
 Earl. Each one have six childy
 Will married Myrtle Sawwater
 Earl married Waddy Emert, both
 of their Mothers were Mattakes and sisters
 Earl has five daughters, one son
 Emert Earl Crossan Will has three
 sons three daughters. written by their Mother
 Martha Louisa Crossan at the age of 81 yrs
